Corrie Williamson

Revery Will Do: Imagination and Conservation on Montana's Great Plains



Corrie Williamson was born on a small farm in southwestern Virginia and currently lives in Lewistown, Montana. She is the author of three books of poetry, most recently *Your Mother's Bear Gun* (2025), from River River Books. Her other books are *The River Where You Forgot My Name*, which was named a 2019 Montana Book Award Honor Book by the Montana Library Association and *Sweet Husk*, which won the 2014 Perugia Press Prize and was a finalist for the 2015 Library of Virginia Poetry Award. She is also co-editor of the eco-poetry anthology *Rocky Mountains Literary Field Guide*, forthcoming from Mountaineers Books in 2027.


Corrie Williamson—author, teacher, naturalist, and Community Outreach Director at American Prairie—will blend poetry, history, and restoration ecology in a presentation that travels across time, geography, and literature. She will be introduced by Stephenie Ambrose-Tubbs, daughter of the late Stephen E. Ambrose, for whom the lecture is named.

Williamson, who grew up in the same small Virginia town as William Clark's first wife, Julia Hancock, will share her connections to the history and landscape of the Corps of Discovery and how it led her to Montana and to her work connecting storytelling, conservation, and communities. Her lecture will include work from her award-winning collections of poems as well as other important literary touchpoints and perspectives related to the Great Northern Plains' history and habitat.

Williamson will discuss her work at the conservation NGO American Prairie, and its mission to connect, protect, and share 3.2 million acres of Montana's grasslands. She will reflect on how this work extends beyond habitat and wildlife conservation to intertwine with the stories we tell about the past, what we can imagine and hope for the future, and how these together shape our paths forward.

Books will be for sale by the Montana Book Company and a book signing will follow the lecture. We hope you will join us!

2025: A positive year filled with growth and promise ...




As Library years are concerned, 2025 is a big one. It is shaping up to be a very positive year filled with growth and promise for the future. I would like to use this space to tell you about two big projects: one coming to fruition this year and another just kicking off.

First, a project announced at the annual Donor Appreciation event in April 2024 is coming to an end very soon. **That project is the addition of a new bookmobile to the Library's vehicle fleet.** We started looking at the need to replace our aging bookmobile in 2021, and received a large gift from the estate of Bob Morgan, longtime friend of the Library and former Foundation Board member. That seed money led to an active fundraising campaign for the Foundation that raised \$39,165 from donors and \$5,000 from a Treacy Foundation grant. Combined with the generous Morgan bequest and monies from a Special Projects Fund, the Foundation will cover \$250,000 of the \$550,000 price tag for the new bookmobile.

Working with a consultant, Library staff issued a Request For Proposal (RFP) for a new bookmobile in early 2025. Staff selected the Indiana-based coachworks company High Level Enterprises to build and outfit a new machine for us to travel the roads of Lewis and Clark County. The bookmobile will sit on a Freightliner 27-foot chassis with a hybrid drivetrain.

The rig is being built as I write this and we expect delivery in the new year. Donors who generously responded to the New Bookmobile Campaign will be invited to a special ribbon-cutting event. And everyone who attends Donor Appreciation Night next April will be treated to a tour. We're all very excited and very appreciative of your support.

The second, even bigger project is unfolding in East Helena.

After a couple of years of meetings and negotiations with the City of East Helena, the Library secured a piece of land on which to build a new library for the quickly growing community of East Helena. Set in JFK Park, between the municipal pool and a beautiful grove of cottonwood trees and walking trails, the site will provide a perfect spot for an 11,000-square-foot branch library building.

A Request for Qualifications (RFQ) was released on October 11. Responses are due to the Library by November 3. We will then select a team to design the new building and present a budget.

We are projecting a cost of \$6 million to design and build the new East Helena branch facility. With \$2 million in savings and the ability to borrow \$2 million, we are looking at a fundraising lift of the final \$2 million. We have been in discussions with the Foundation Board to help raise the needed funds and plans are to launch a Capital Campaign in the new year. We estimate that the project will be done within three years.

This is all very exciting. While this growth continues to move us forward, the Library continues to provide the citizens of Lewis and Clark County the best possible Library collections, services, and programs. Please let me know if you have questions, concerns, or ideas for improvement.

Every year the Foundation receives a Wish List from Library staff that provides wonderful hands-on materials and essential library services that truly enhance patrons' experiences and broadens outreach to a wider segment of our community. Thanks to the generous support of our Library Foundation, our Library of Things collection grew tremendously over the past year!

One of the most exciting additions was our new **Board Games Collection**, which became an instant hit—so popular that our shelves were nearly empty for months after launch. With that continued enthusiasm, we've requested additional funding this year to expand the collection even further.



We also introduced several accessibility-focused items to help patrons of all abilities enjoy the Library. Among them are **reader smart pens**, which scan and read text aloud in multiple languages—an invaluable resource for users with dyslexia or reading challenges.

Another exciting addition is our **LED Light Therapy Lamps**. For those of us who experience long Montana winters, these lamps mimic natural sunlight to help improve mood, boost energy, and support healthy sleep.



Coming soon, we're thrilled to launch **11 new Early Literacy Kits**. Each kit focuses on a theme—such as farm animals, transportation, or numbers—and includes books, activities, and toys designed to encourage families to learn and play together while developing the five key early literacy skills: Talking, Singing, Reading, Writing, and Playing.

Looking ahead, we're continuing to expand the Library of Things and Board Games collections across both the Helena location and our branches. Staff surveys are helping identify the most-requested items, with priority given to branch recommendations to ensure equitable access for all the communities we serve.

Reflections of our outgoing Foundation Board Members



LORNA MILNE: Six years on the Lewis & Clark Library Foundation board has shown me how beloved our county's libraries are. I had a vague sense of this before joining the board, but to visit the libraries in Augusta and Lincoln and East Helena, to hear about the weekly treks the bookmobile makes—this has brought the vitality of our libraries and the services they provide home to me.

The Foundation Board had Zoom meetings and hoped to someday resume author talks, poetry readings, workshops, and receptions. The Library finally moved from a temporary branch to an April 2021 opening. What a long way we have traveled since then.



Under the leadership of Library Director John Finn, the Foundation Board had the ability to translate other ambitious visions into reality, including ordering a fully funded new bookmobile and starting an East Helena Library branch capital campaign.

It has been an honor to serve on the Library Foundation Board alongside wonderful colleagues, passionate staff, and generous community support and to witness the amazing changes and accomplishments.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve on the Lewis & Clark Library Foundation Board and to contribute to the Library's growth during this vital period.

Foundation Funds in Review

In a nutshell, at the end of **FY 2025** (June 30, 2025) the Foundation's total assets were **\$1,527,797**. Our D.A. Davidson Sustainability Fund held **\$938,560**. Our Special Projects Account held **\$444,420**. At the end of FY 2025, there was a total of **\$145,817** in cash accounts (which contains funds for the new bookmobile that was received from donors and will be expended this year).

We are pleased to report that **\$76,929** was received in unrestricted charitable contributions from generous donors during FY 2025. A total of **\$35,351** was generated from the Sarah McCabe Power Trust and **\$4,635** from the Montana Community Foundation. Together, the Dorothy Thayer Trust and Bernice Boone Trust support the purchase of books and other literary materials every year, and in FY 2025 provided **\$48,810** for this purpose.

Foundation expenditures totaled **\$90,985** in FY 2025, following a budget that allowed up to **\$145,550** in expenditures.


